Highlights from 2007

Looking back at 2007, there have been many City accomplishments. Here are just a few of the many projects that City staff completed over the course of the year...

- In collaboration with AirCloud Communications, the City installed WiFi along Contra Costa Boulevard. Eventually this coverage will expand to include the entire city.
- The City created the "SEED" Team (Site Evaluation and Economic Devel-

opment), an interdepartmental group of staff members, to prepare a data base of major non-residential sites in the community and to evaluate potential sites for economic development and redevelopment.

■ The Redevelopment Agency negotiated and adopted two separate Agreements that will result in a new Friedmans Appliances store—twice the size of the existing store—and additional major tenant and shop space, all to be open by mid-2008.

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City moves to weekly recycling beginning March 31

The City Council recently approved a new agreement with Allied Waste Services which will introduce weekly recycling for all Pleasant Hill residents and a revision of garbage rates to encourage more recycling and less waste going into the landfill.

The new garbage rates will take effect on April 1, 2008 and will depend on the size of your garbage cart. You will be given the opportunity to select one of four sizes – a 20, 32, 64 or 96-gallon cart. There will be no change to your brown recycling cart or the green waste cart.

These rate changes for garbage disposal and recycling are necessary to ensure that the City continues to meet at

least a 50% recycling rate, which is mandated by the State of California. The California Integrated Waste Management Board (CIWMB) has also asked the City to change the garbage rates to a more volume-based rate structure. In other words, those customers who

News from the City

- Extensive work by the Redevelopment Advisory Commission and staff resulted in the Agency adopting a policy to provide additional affordable housing opportunities in the community by offering rental assistance to low-income families.
- Business Licensing issued more than 4,000 licenses in 2007. This included 1,400 commercial businesses and approximately 2,400 home-based businesses.
- The Police Department reported that serious crime decreased by 21% in Pleasant Hill during 2007. The Police also conducted Emergency Preparedness training sessions for city staff and will be updating the City's emergency policy this year.
- The Building Division expedited approximately 1,430 building permits, including permits for the Morello Estates subdivision, El Tapatio Restaurant, and tenant improvements at the Crossroads Shopping Center.

The Engineering Division...

- Resurfaced almost 7.5 miles of city streets.
- Retrofitted almost 100 existing pedestrian ramps to conform to current federal accessibility standards.
- Worked with the Mt. Diablo Unified School District to reduce traffic congestion along Boyd Road at Sequoia Elementary and Middle schools.
- Secured over \$715,000 in Grant monies to subsidize seven new capital improvement projects.

The Maintenance Division...

- Proceeded with the redesign of 17 medians located on or near Contra Costa Boulevard with new landscaping.
- Contacted and worked with 425 residents living along City creeks and waterways to coordinate annual clean-up efforts.
- Completed the inspection and clean-up of all 1500 catch basins to keep storm water flowing and es-

- tablished a program with Contra Costa Mosquito & Vector Control to mitigate threats from West Nile virus.
- Implemented a pothole repair program to keep streets safe and in prime condition.

The Planning Division...


- Was awarded the first annual 2007 Association of Bay Area Governments (ABAG) Growing Smarter Together Award for the newly-completed Villa Montanaro Apartment Complex at the northeast corner of Buskirk and Coggins Drive.
- Drafted a condominium conversion ordinance requiring that physical improvements comply with current building codes and ensured that apartment rentals are maintained at a certain level in Pleasant Hill.
- Drafted new "Design Guidelines" which are intended to encourage quality, well-designed development throughout Pleasant Hill that enhances existing neighborhoods, creates identity, and improves the overall quality of life within the City. ♣

generate more garbage (and less recycling) should pay more than those who generate less garbage.

Currently, 78% of Pleasant Hill customers have a 96-gallon cart for garbage and only 17% have either a 32 or 64-gallon cart. Those residents with a 96-gallon cart pay only \$1 more per month than those with a 32-gallon cart. This minimal difference in rates offers no incentive for residents to reduce their cart size.

However, with the introduction of weekly recycling, all residents should be able to divert recyclable materials from their garbage cart and therefore reduce the need for the larger carts. The end result will be that most customers will either see a reduction in



The accompanying table outlines the new garbage rates.

Survey results have shown that these new rates are comparable to other cities in Contra Costa County and are below average for both the 64 and

96-gallon cart rates. The new rates also include a cost of living adjustment which would normally take effect on January 1 of each year but will not be introduced until the new rates go into effect on April 1, 2008.

Allied Waste Services will begin replacing carts on March 31, 2008. Over the next several months, AWS and the City of Pleasant Hill will provide additional information on the schedule for cart replacement. 3rd grade students from Valhalla Elementary School hold mock City Council meeting

Thursday, December 6, 2007 was an historic day in Pleasant Hill as one hundred 3rd grade students from Valhalla Elementary School conducted their first ever Council Meeting in the Council Chambers at City Hall.

Mayor Megan Bristow presided over the proceedings as the five Councilmembers, ably assisted by their staff, heard testimony from various members of the "Valhalla public" about a number of critical issues ranging from cookies at lunch to water fountains to having more theme days at school.

Mayor Bristow was joined on the dais by Councilmembers Megan Austin, Kole Kazda, Kayla Brooks and Sierra Birade. The five Councilmembers were supported by City Manager Marissa



St. Marseille, City Clerk Gabriela Joseph, City Attorney Jacob Ricafrente, Police Chief Alice Woo, Community Service Director Max Anderson, and Public Information Officer Langston Mendonsa.

The Council considered five agenda items and heard arguments for and against each motion from other members of the 3rd grade class. There was much debate and discussion on whether cookies or a salad bar should be added to the daily lunch menu at school. Strong arguments were presented in favor of and against both proposals, and the Council was divided in their opinion on both items. On a split vote, the Council voted against the cookies and in favor of having the salad bar, with the Mayor casting the deciding vote. After the meeting, Mayor Bristow maintained that her vote was in no way influenced by the fact that her Mom was in the audience.

In other matters, the Council voted in favor of more water fountains throughout the school, denied a request to grant 4th and 5th graders P.E. on Friday afternoons, and, surprisingly, decided against introducing more "Spirit Theme Days" at the school.

NEW BUILDING CODES NOW ENFORCED

Just a reminder—the new building codes have taken effect as of January 1, 2008. Working with new codes can be challenging, but if we all work together we will make the transition as simple as possible. Here are just a few examples of code changes that have occurred:

CODE	OLD (2001)	NEW (2007)
Minimum stair run	9 inches	10 inches
Maximum stair rise	8 inches	7.75 inches
Guardrails required	When more than 30 inches above grade or floor, then 36 inches high	When more than 40 inches high except side of stairs, then 34–38 inches high
Bedroom window egress	44 inches maximum to sill	44 inches maximum to opening
Attic access	22 inches x 30 inches	20 inches x 30 inches
kitchen clearance	Not required	36 inches clear passage in kitchens at counter fronts or at appliances

As seen in these examples, the changes are not dramatic but necessary. Hopefully, the contractors working in our city have already obtained their copies of the new codes to make your project run smoothly. Any homeowner with questions can obtain this information through the International Code Council (ICC)—1-888-422-7233 or call one of the field inspectors for clarification at 671-5200.

CONTAINERS

A container or storage unit is allowed for up to 10 calendar days, or for a longer period if there is a grading or building permit for construction on the site and a zoning permit has been issued for the container or storage unit.

All containers are to be stored on your own property. Maintain clearances to sidewalks and public right-of-way. If special circumstances arise, encroachment permits from Public Works will be required. REMEMBER, these units are for temporary use only.

Community Garden is starting to take shape

Students of the Gardening Program of Mt. Diablo Adult Education are teaming up with the City of Pleasant Hill and the Contra Costa Central Sanitary District to create a beautiful, water-conserving garden at the Pleasant Hill Adult Education Center on Santa Barbara Road, next to the Pleasant Hill Middle School.

It will serve as a demonstration garden using healthy garden practices (no pesticides), water conservation and recycling methods, and drought-tolerant and native plantings. Other participants in this project include the Boy Scouts, Girl

Scouts, Contra Costa Master Gardeners, DVC's adaptive horticulture class, neighbors, and other interested volunteers.



The kickoff of the all-volunteer project was held on Community Service Day, September 15, when volunteers met to start a path through the garden, mix mulch into the soil-and found out how really compacted and difficult the clay soil was to work. Recent work parties have been able to finish several paths, prepare the soil for planting, and plant the first beds in the first phase of the project, which may be completed late next year.

you will find a lovely oasis. Students will be able to use the garden to learn about many subjects. Middle School children will find a more welcoming path to their school. Garden Park Apartments offers safe haven for struggling families

Permanent, supportive housing describes a special place to live, and Garden Park Apartments is much more than a complex of apartments. It is a community with onsite staff including a full-time live-in property manager, around-the-clock desk clerks, a fulltime licensed services director, and a part-time volunteer coordinator.

The Garden Park Apartments is also blessed to have the support and backing of 25 interdenominational faith communities and the support of the City of Pleasant Hill.

Families eligible to live at Garden Park Apartments have been through hard times. When they come to the Apartments, they are homeless, have an adult member with a disability, and have very low incomes. The average household earns less then \$9,000 per year. They have been homeless, often because of struggles with physical illness, mental illness, and/or addiction to alcohol/drugs. The Garden Park Apartments is a family place, so children make up over half of the tenants. These children have been through many challenges and difficulties in their short lives.

The cornerstone of permanent supportive housing is the on-site support services. Studies show that individuals and families who have spe-

cial needs are better able to break the cycle of homelessness when the housing includes support. The support staff at Garden Park Apartments are funded 100% with donations and community grants. They also welcome anyone who wants to join their cadre of dedicated and talented volunteers who provide homework support and tutoring to adults and youth and engage the youngest tenants in storytime and emerging-reader activities. Volunteers also furnish and equip units for new families and provide the bulk of land-scaping services to the site.

Contra Costa Interfaith Housing is a 501C(3) non profit, so all donations are

tax deductible. Your support also saves tax dollars due to our effective prevention of many problems. It is estimated that Garden Park Apartment programs save over \$1.5 million per year in emergency, child protective, criminal justice, and other service costs.

Around our community....

Pleasant Hill Community Foundation celebrates more than two decades of serving the community

During this time the Foundation has awarded 221 grants totaling over \$250,000.

In 1986 five Pleasant Hill community leaders formed the Pleasant Hill Foundation, later renamed the Pleasant Hill Community Foundation (PHCF). The original purpose was to encourage donations which would be used for the development and support of community programs. Five more members were later added to the board of directors. In October of 1987 they held their first fundraising dinner, during which they agreed on three main goals:

Pleasant Hill

- Raise money for community projects.
- Be a clearinghouse for other nonprofit projects.
- Start an endowment program where the profits of the raised funds could be used for future causes.

The Foundation runs the Annual Pleasant Hill Sun Valley Golf Classic which has raised over \$100,000 for various community projects over the past seven years.

As well as annually requesting gifts from the public, the Foundation has spearheaded special projects. During 1990 and 1991 they sold and placed 687 personal tiles in the new Pleasant Hill City Hall walkways and patio. A gazebo and trellis were constructed from the proceeds.

In 1993 and 1994 PHCF raised over \$40,000 for playground apparatus. During 2002 and 2003 they worked with the Pleasant Hill Tennis Club to raise \$39,000. However, the largest project to date has been the raising of \$174,623 for the Sprayground construction at Pleasant Hill Aquatic Center.

The Foundation recently announced the 2007 Youth Grant Awards for the following projects:

- College Park High School for the Stadium Project, Every 15 Minutes, and Girls Tennis Team.
- Pleasant Hill Dolfins Swim Club for new timing mechanisms.
- Pleasant Hill Police Department for High School Garage Bands at the Lake.
- Pleasant Hill Recreation & Park District for a new Web site run by Teen Council, Intergenerational Culinary Arts, and a new engine for the Pleasant Hill Express Train.
- Valley View Middle School for the Prowler newsletter.
- S.T.A.G.E. Troupe for a new microphone.

The proceeds from the 7th Annual Pleasant Hill Sunvalley Golf Classic held last May contributed to the more than \$16,000 distributed in these grant awards.

The Foundation will be accepting proposals for its Community Grant Awards in the spring of 2008. The 8th Annual Pleasant Hill Sunvalley Golf Classic will be held May 12, 2008. Please join them in supporting the youth of Pleasant Hill.

Red Cross Blood Center open for additional hours

The American Red Cross Blood Center in Pleasant Hill has extended its hours on a regular basis. The center opens its doors from 7am to 7:30pm on Monday through Thursday, and 7:30am to 3pm on Friday and the weekend. The additional hours have been added as blood donations typically slow down during year-end holidays and the New Year period, and the Red Cross hopes these new hours will make donation easier to fit into busy schedules.

Research shows that only 38% of the public is eligible to give blood, and a minority, less than 8% of these individuals, actually donate blood each year, making it difficult to maintain an adequate blood supply. The additional hours will allow the Red Cross to accommodate 100 more blood donors each week. The Red Cross states that every blood donation can help to save three lives.

PH Senior Center—a great place to be 50 plus



Plan ahead for the winter storms

Sandbags

Now that winter rains are here, you may be worried about flooding on your property. The City will have sandbag stations available again this winter for residents to use during the storm season. Three "fill-your-own" sandbag stations are available from November through March:

- City Hall parking lot on Trelany Road (100 Gregory Lane)
- Pleasant Hill Community Center parking lot on Civic Drive, at the northwest corner of the parking lot
- Monticello and Oak Park Boulevard (in the vacant lot across from library)

These sandbag stations are stocked with a shovel, a large pile of sand, and empty sandbags. The sandbags are free; Pleasant Hill residents are asked to take only what is needed, with a suggested limit of 10 bags per household.



In the event of a major storm or flooding emergency, the City, along with CERT (Community Emergency Response Team) volunteers, will prepare sandbags that are ready to use. Prior to a major storm City Maintenance staff will deliver the ready-to-use sandbag pallets to four areas throughout the community. Sign boards will be placed along the street to direct residents to the sandbag stations.

Winter storm tracking

Winter weather reports can be found on the City's website, by clicking the red box labeled "Weather Watch." Here you'll find a summary of the National Weather Service forecast, including weather watches, warnings, and advisories. It's a complement to other sources, such as newspapers, radio, TV, and online, which also provide weather tracking information.

Storm drains

During the winter months, the storm drain system is often filled to capacity with run-off from rain. To prevent flooding in your neighborhood, it's especially important to keep leaves and other debris out of the streets to avoid clogging the storm drains. Keep an eye on the streets, gutters, catch basins, culverts, and drainage ditches in your area to make sure that they remain clean and clear of debris. If you have concerns about drainage in your neighborhood, call the Maintenance Division at 925-671-4646.


Adam Nilsen, Pleasant Hill native and historian, answers these questions and more about Pleasant Hill's intriguing past in a brand new pictorial history book.


